What are Peer-Reviewed ACT Trainers?

- Peer Reviewed ACT Trainers (PRTs) is a group under the responsibility of the Training Committee composed of expert trainers in ACT that devoted their time to be of service to the ACBS Community.
- They are recognized to deliver ACT trainings with excellency in terms of ACT theoretical foundations, skills and experiential practice.

Certification

- ACBS does not certify anyone.
- To be a PRT **does not mean** to become a Certified ACT Trainer/Therapist/Practitioner.
- A lot of brilliant ACT trainers chose not to become listed as a PRT.

Why become a PRT?

To be listed is a pragmatic way of assisting trainees to find high quality ACT Trainings.

The PRT Community holds a commitment to train with excellence and fidelity in the ACT model while sharing common held values.

Anyone can provided ACT Trainings without going through the PRT process.

Why become a PRT?

It is also a way to give back to the ACBS Community. Being a PRT amplifies your voice to "spread the word" better.

The PRT process is a volunteer one and serves as a way to give back to the ACBS community if that aligns with your professional aspirations.

To be part of this community is not so much about "what do I get" but rather "how can I contribute?"

The real work starts when you get in!



What do I need in order to apply?

- To be listed, six criteria must be met:
- 1. Agree and sign with the trainers list of principles and values.
- 2. Have a Terminal Degree in Behavioral Health Field*
- 3. Be known to be of good character.
- 4. Be highly efficacious on the core ACT clinical skills and competencies.
- 5. Be highly efficacious in training others in ACT.
- 6. Have a good working knowledge of ACT underpinnings (Behavior Analysis, Relational Frame Theory and Functional Contextualism).



Fees

- There's an administrative fee for applying to this process of 80 USD. If you're from a Developing Nation that fee is 10 USD.
- The fee is destined to administrative issues in the PRT process. No PRT gets paid to evaluate you.
- In case that fee might be a barrier to you, you can reach ACBS administration since it is not meant to be excludent.



How can my training be observed?

- As part of the process, your training must be assessed by two current members of the PRT Community. The observations can be:
 - Live Observations (e.g., You host a workshop at ACBS World Conference and make a request for your training to be observed).
 - Recorded Observations of a training event you held
 - Your vídeo shouldn't be longer than 3 hours.
 - When submitting a vídeo, you must submit a viewer's guide to direct the reviewer's attention to specific portions of your training that demonstrate which competencies are you training your participants.



What if my language isn't English?
